



Car rental Meknes — gates & Volubilis roads

Meknes is less crowded than Fes and a smart base for Volubilis and Moulay Idriss. Hashkarat Maroko: popular with Hebrew-speaking travellers exploring Morocco.

Wide boulevards and Bab Mansour make orientation easy. Drive to Roman Volubilis early, then return for medina markets. Sultan Moulay Ismail's vast Heri es-Souani granaries and stables were built to hold enough grain and horses to withstand a long siege, and the scale of the vaulted ceilings still comes as a surprise to most first-time visitors.

Often combined with Fes stays. Ask for hotel delivery if you arrive by train. Meknes makes a relaxed overnight base if Fes feels too intense — hotel prices are usually lower for a similar standard of comfort. Book via Hashkarat Maroko to lock your preferred car.

Highlights



Bab Mansour

Widely considered the grandest of Morocco's imperial gates, built at the end of the 17th century under Sultan Moulay Ismail as the ceremonial entrance to the royal palace complex. The scale and tilework are worth seeing even briefly if you are only passing through Meknes on the way to Volubilis.

It sits right on Place el-Hedim, an easy and central place to park before continuing into the medina on foot.



Dar Jamai Museum & Medina

A 19th-century palace just off Place el-Hedim, now a museum of Moroccan crafts, with a quiet interior garden that is a good break from the busier streets outside. The surrounding medina is calmer and less visited than Fes's, which makes it a comfortable introduction to Moroccan old-town markets.

Meknes works well as a single stop combined with Volubilis and Moulay Idriss Zerhoun earlier in the day, since all three are a short drive apart.

Good to know

A little history

Founded in the 11th century, Meknes became an imperial capital in the 17th century under Sultan Moulay Ismail, who built its extensive fortifications and palaces. It is a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

Local customs

- Dress modestly, especially at religious sites and in more traditional neighbourhoods.
- Ask before photographing people directly, especially women.
- Hagglng is expected in souks and markets; fixed-price shops and restaurants are not negotiable.
- A tip of around 10% is customary at restaurants; small tips for guides and porters are appreciated.
- Friday is the main day of prayer — some businesses close or reduce hours around midday.
- During Ramadan, avoid eating, drinking or smoking in public during daylight hours out of respect.
- Alcohol is available at licensed hotels, bars and some restaurants, but not sold everywhere — public intoxication is frowned upon.
- Driving is on the right; seatbelts are mandatory, and traffic already in a roundabout generally has priority.
