



Car rental Rabat — capital & airport RBA

Rabat combines royal gardens, Atlantic light and easy access to the north. Hashkarat Maroko: popular with Hebrew-speaking travellers exploring Morocco.

The administrative capital is calmer than Casablanca. With a rental car you can combine the Kasbah of the Udayas, Chellah ruins and coastal drives toward Salé without relying on taxis. Away from the ministries and embassies, the medina and coastal Kasbah quarter feel more like a small, relaxed town than a capital, and the drive north to Salé's beaches takes barely twenty minutes.

Rabat-Salé airport (RBA) is compact; free airport meet is available. The city is genuinely walkable once parked, so leave the car at your riad or hotel rather than trying to find on-street parking near the Kasbah. Book via Hashkarat Maroko to lock your preferred car.

Highlights



Kasbah of the Udayas

A 12th-century fortified citadel overlooking the mouth of the Bou Regreg river, with whitewashed and blue-painted lanes that are among the most photogenic in Morocco. The Andalusian Gardens inside the kasbah walls are a quiet spot to rest between sightseeing stops.

There is a viewing terrace at the far end looking out over the river toward Salé — a good, uncrowded spot for photos of the coastline.



Hassan Tower & Mausoleum of Mohammed V

The unfinished minaret of a 12th-century mosque that was never completed, standing alongside the mausoleum of Morocco's modern royal family. The site is open and free to visit, with the columns of the original mosque still standing in rows across the plaza.

It sits right on one of Rabat's main avenues, so it is an easy stop to combine with a drive through the city centre or a visit to the nearby Kasbah of the Udayas.

Good to know

A little history

Rabat has been Morocco's political capital since 1912 and was confirmed as such at independence in 1956. The Kasbah of the Udayas dates to the 12th century Almohad era, and the city's blend of historic and planned modern quarters is UNESCO World Heritage-listed.

Local customs

- Dress modestly, especially at religious sites and in more traditional neighbourhoods.
- Ask before photographing people directly, especially women.
- Hagglng is expected in souks and markets; fixed-price shops and restaurants are not negotiable.
- A tip of around 10% is customary at restaurants; small tips for guides and porters are appreciated.
- Friday is the main day of prayer — some businesses close or reduce hours around midday.
- During Ramadan, avoid eating, drinking or smoking in public during daylight hours out of respect.
- Alcohol is available at licensed hotels, bars and some restaurants, but not sold everywhere — public intoxication is frowned upon.
- Driving is on the right; seatbelts are mandatory, and traffic already in a roundabout generally has priority.
